The Pastor's Pen - July 2021

Webster's dictionary defines the word literally in two ways...

- 1) in a literal sense or manner: such as
 - a. in a way that uses the ordinary or primary meaning of a term or expression
 - b. used to emphasize the truth and accuracy of a statement or description
 - c. with exact equivalence: with the meaning of each individual word given exactly
 - d. in a completely accurate way
- in effect: VIRTUALLY used in an exaggerated way to emphasize a statement or description that is not literally true or possible¹

Why do these two definitions seem to be describing opposite words? Because the English language (and all languages for that matter) is in a constant state of fluctuation. The word *literally* has seen a major shift in its use over the past five centuries when Martin Luther used the latin term sensus literalis to describe the proper way to interpret Scripture. When Luther spoke of sensus literalis he was expressing an interpretive approach that would consider the type of literature that one was reading.

For example, when one reads the Psalms, that person must know that he is reading poetic, musical lyrics that were sung by Jewish people thousands of years prior. So in Psalm 91 when we read, "He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty," it is understood that the shelter of the Most High does not refer to the base camp on Mount Everest and that the shadow of the Almighty is not talking about the actual shadow of the strongest man alive. We know that this passage refers to trusting in God and finding peace in Him. That is the sensus literalis. It is how we can read the Bible literally with the original definition of that word.

Why am I talking about this? Because we as a church are about to enter one of the most difficult and often debated passages of Scripture: Matthew 24. In Jesus' Olivet discourse Jesus begins to speak in what is known as apocalyptic language. This is a special type of literature that is used sporadically throughout the Bible. You will find such language employed in the Old Testament by many of the prophets. It is also predominant in the book of Revelation.

Apocalyptic language is known for its heavy symbolism and hyperbole. A great example of this is in the book of Isaiah, chapter 19, when God speaks of judgment coming upon the nation of Egypt...

An oracle concerning Egypt:

See, the LORD rides on a swift cloud and is coming to Egypt.

The idols of Egypt tremble before him,

And the hearts of the Egyptians melt within them.

Now when this judgment came upon Egypt, did people actually see God riding upon a speedy cloud? Did the gold idols really begin to tremble as if they were afraid? Did the hearts of the people truly melt away as if they were made of wax? Of course not. Yet this picture accurately describes the judgment of God upon this nation.

When we get to Matthew 24, we will see Jesus using very similar language. He will describe the sun being darkened and the moon not giving its light. He will speak of the stars falling from the sky and the heavenly bodies shaking. How are we to interpret this if we are to take the Bible *literally*?

I believe the older definition of the word, the definition that Martin Luther used, the **sensus literalis**, is the proper way to go about this passage as well as all passages in God's Word. Let us understand that Jesus is speaking apocalyptically. Let us know that He is employing heavy use of both metaphor and hyperbole. Only then can we get to the true sense of the text and what Christ was actually communicating to both His disciples and to us.
