- Encourage further leadership development

- Communicate strategic progress and regular updates about pastoral search to congregation for prayer
- ✤ Celebrate God's provision for the church during interim
- Call a biblically qualified pastor who fits the vision and strategic initiative

church directory to lift up a few people each morning. Please join me in prayer as God continues to use FCC for his glory. .

# First Things First

Face it, we all have priorities. Our world keeps us busier than ever causing us to be constantly on the go. Unfortunately, being so overloaded causes stress and anxiety. Whether it is responsibilities with home, work, school, church, and volunteering; or kids and grandkids, doctor appointments, and finances, we set priorities. Even in our downtime, we establish priorities.

In the book of Ezekiel, we read, "The best of all first fruits and all your special gifts will belong to the priests. You are to give them the first portion of your ground meal so that a blessing may rest on your household." Ezekiel 44:30. This is the instruction God provided when restoring Israel and the priesthood. God had enough of the people's detestable practices. Right now, I'm sure you're wondering what this has to do with us today and our priorities in life. Well, hang in there, I promise I will tie this in shortly. Now, I am going to shift gears a little and talk about stewardship. This a topic that hasn't been addressed much here in the church, and no, I am not going to bring up money. I will address the stewardship of time, which will soon tie into Ezekiel.

We know that from the beginning of time, God created everything (Genesis 1-2). This means that everything God has created belongs to Him and that He allows us to have things here on earth and requires good stewardship. In this, we're not only to take care of earthly possessions but also the time God has given every one of us. We are to use our time wisely because the days on which we live are evil, and we do not know the day or hour when our Lord comes (Matthew 25:13). To use our time wisely means to use it to prepare for eternity. How is your relationship with God? With Jesus? If God demanded your life from you right now, are you prepared to stand before His throne of judgment? Before the bema seat? The point is: time is short and uncertain. Solomon declares in Ecclesiastes 3:1-2, "There is a time for everything and a season for every activity under the heavens, a time to be born and a time to die." Solomon's wisdom teaches us that our life is a vapor that is here one minute and gone the next.

Time is easily lost and is one thing that we can never regain. We should value every minute. Time is also something for which we are held accountable. In Romans 14:11-12, Paul reminds us, "It is written: As surely as I live, says the Lord, every knee will bow before Me, every tongue will acknowledge God. So then, each of

us will give an account of ourselves to God." When you go through your day, how much of the time God has given you do you spend with Him? How much time do you spend in prayer, song, praise, or worship? The more time you spend with God, with Christ Jesus who is our Savior and advocate before the Father, the stronger relationship you will have with Him.

Getting back to Ezekiel... God said, "the best of all first fruits and all your special gifts will belong to the priests.... You are to give them the first portion". The application of this passage for us today is this: When



you go through your day, what portion of time do you give to God, and when do you give it to Him? Jesus is our High Priest. We should be good stewards and give Him our first fruits, the first portion of our time. We should adjust our priorities to spend time with Him. Instead of getting our coffee, flipping on the tv news, or jumping on our phones or social media apps, shouldn't we spend a little time with our Lord? It would be a wise investment of time now for eternity to come. Wouldn't you rather enter God's kingdom as a wellknown child of God than a stranger who barely has a relationship with Jesus?

Proverbs 27:1 says, "Do not boast about tomorrow, you do not know what a day may bring." Don't fall under the illusion that you can save, buy, borrow, or makeup time. You can't. Pastor and author Donald Whitney says that giving to God is measured in the heart, and the standard of measurement that is used is the depth of love for God. As you go throughout your days, think about where your priorities lie. Are you putting nonnecessities before God? Do you use Sunday as a day to stay and sleep-in to relieve yourself of your stress and anxiety? Do you put other activities before God? Maybe it's time to re-prioritize. Jesus made us His priority; shouldn't we make Him ours? Even the first ten minutes of our day? I think the High Priest is most deserving of the first fruits of our time. Let's invest in eternity and strengthen our relationship with Jesus and the Father. With that first portion, God's blessing will be on your household. What a promise to receive! Biblical giving, whether time, talent, or treasure, displays a heart that worships God. Where will your priorities lie?

## The Role of a Deacon, Part Two

In last month's newsletter, I wanted to share with everyone a better understanding of what a deacon is within the Congregational Church setting and their role in ministry. I felt this fitting since we're in a pastoral transition period, and your deacons will be working carefully and diligently with our Intentional Interim Pastor Greg Carlson over the next several months to explore our church, its mission, values, and vision for the future. Not to mention, examining areas within the church that require healing or improvement which leads to growth. Again, my goal is not only to inform you of what a deacon does but also to inspire you to consider whether serving as a deacon may be something you wish to do in the church.



Last month, I covered the attributes, responsibilities, and qualifications of a deacon. This month, we'll examine the role of relationships. Individuals in positions of lay leadership are and can be influential. If a pastor is to ever succeed in a church, he needs advocates and not adversaries. The deacon helps to foster a productive environment within the church and with the pastor, so the church is welcoming, pleasant, and affirming. A church where people are appreciated and encouraged cultivates growth. They help each other identify weaknesses and foster solutions. The deacon is part of mutual support not only with the pastor but also with other deacons. They engage in continuing education together, delegate and share responsibilities and use their gifts for the ministry, whether that involves visiting sick or homebound members, scheduling activities, or hosting and leading Bible study. Whatever occurs in the church, the deacon ensures it aligns with the mission of the church. Above all else, the deacon prays. They pray for members of the church, for each other, and for other lay leaders and the pastor.

## The Role of a Deacon, Part Two

Now we come to the more visual piece which many of you are accustomed to which involves the duties performed by the deacon. As we all know, the deacon is involved with regular participation in worship, but this doesn't mean just on Sunday. The deacon must be involved with matters such as, "Why are we doing this in worship?," and "Why are we doing this now?" The deacon must know and understand the Scriptures, church doctrine, and traditions. The deacon is responsible for the Lord's Supper which you experience every month. They prepare the sacred meal, set the table, and help serve during worship. The deacon must be prepared to speak on this subject and why it is practiced within the church.

The deacon also participates in lay ministry which includes the reading of Scripture, prayer (both public and private), and even preaching. The deacon is involved with music, working with the music committee to ensure that it is appropriate for proper worship and aligns with Scripture. In the absence of the pastor, the deacon is responsible for pulpit supply. They're to know resources within the community and the church. A deacon has the responsibility to encourage and support their pastor in Bible study activities. Deacons and lay leadership should strive to teach and lead Bible study along with the pastor. A deacon is a person who is ready to discuss spiritual needs if the opportunity arises, which may include sharing faith statements or personal testimony. The deacon must be a person who grows in the assurance of personal faith and helps others within the congregation grow in theirs. When it comes to growth, the deacon is involved with growing the church with prospective new members. As you can see, there's a lot to be accomplished by someone who is a deacon and I've only given you a closer look without getting deep into all the smaller details. Above all else, the deacon is a servant. Words alone are not enough. Action is required, as explained by the apostle James 2:15-17.

Sounds like a lot of work, doesn't it? To be candid, it is a lot of work, but when the work is spread out and Christ is in the middle of it all, the work becomes easy and rewarding. So, what are the rewards of being a deacon?

- 1. There is spiritual growth. When deacons get out of their comfort zone and allow God complete control, His wisdom and power flow through them as God then uses them as He wills to His glory.
- 2. There is the satisfaction of deepening relationships with people.
- 3. A deacon is a witness to miracles. Miracles of when the impossible is accomplished and whenever lives are opened to the power of the gospel and people come to Christ.

So, do you have what it takes? Would you desire such a calling? It can be demanding and uncomfortable at times. When we allow God to lead us, the rewards are much more than anyone could ask for. Now you should have a better idea of what your deacons do within the Congregational Church. Over this next year, they will continue learning, leading, teaching, and preaching. They'll be encouraging, serving, and working with our Pastor Carlson. If this appeals to you, seek God, and pray. Ask Him for guidance and to speak to your heart. Get into His word and listen to His calling for you. Let me close with a word from Hebrews 13:17-18a which says, "Have confidence in your leaders and submit to their authority, because they keep watch over you as those who must give an account. Do this so that their work will be a joy, not a burden, for that would be of no benefit to you. Pray for us."

## Happenings in Hungary

March is here! It is not quite spring yet, but we have seen some definite signs that it is on its way. Despite the fact that February was a short month, it was a very full month for us. For one thing, I had several medical appointments and underwent a multitude of tests. Somehow, I managed to contract an infection in my left eye. So, I had to make several trips to an ophthalmologist. She prescribed some antibiotic eye drops that helped clear things up. However, she said the infection in my eye was probably a secondary infection. She then sent me to an ENT. The ENT checked me out and found some swelling in my sinuses, but she couldn't say for sure if I had an infection. She prescribed some medicine and ordered a CT scan of my head. The CT scan didn't find anything in my cranium. I am not sure if that is good or bad. The CT scan, however, did detect some irregularities in my thyroid, so my family doctor ordered two high-definition ultrasound examinations of my thyroid and of the arteries in my neck. So far, none of the doctors and none of the tests have found anything that can't be explained by age-related decrepitude. My next encounter with the Hungarian medical system is coming up next week, when I have my quarterly PSA test (following up on last year's cancer surgery.) After that, I really hope I won't have to deal with the medical system for a while.

As many of you know, I teach English at Szent László Gimnázium. This is one of Budapest's elite public secondary schools. My "seniors" will have their last day of class on April 28. After that, they will spend the months of May and June taking their final exams/university entrance exams. They will have to take written and oral exams in five subjects. The results of these tests will go a long way in determining whether or not they get into university. As you can imagine, this is a time of high anxiety for these

teenagers. Over the last several months, we have watched several films and read some material on the topics of faith, hope, and love. In the time that I have remaining with these students, I hope to tie the three topics together by looking at 1 Corinthians 13. I also hope to share with them in a very clear way why I am a follower of Christ. I would very much appreciate your prayers for this during the weeks ahead.

Meanwhile, Julia continues to teach Sunday School to the school-aged children in our congregation. She was encouraged recently when one of the children told her mother how much she enjoyed coming to church because she loved Julia's lessons. In February, Julia also played a leading role when the Mama-Baba Klub (MOPS ministry) met. The topic was "Fighting Fair in Marriage." Several of the mothers present listened very intently as Julia shared from her experiences. The Mama-Baba Klub will meet again on Wednesday, March 8. The topic will be "Purpose-Driven Moms." Please remember to pray for this meeting. Julia continues to bake up a storm on a regular basis. In addition to whipping up an assortment of goodies for the Mama-Baba Klub once a month, she also bakes treats for the weekly English Club. She rarely comes home with any leftovers. I am not sure, but I think the one young man, Simon, comes primarily in the expectation of sampling Julia's baked goods.

Last week, our congregation held its first Sunday afternoon luncheon since COVID disrupted everyone's lives. It was good to eat and fellowship together once again after the worship service. As expected, there was some very fine fare offered. Julia supplied a broccoli salad that drew raves, as well as some freshly-baked "spoon rolls" (from my grandmother's recipe.)


