I recently sat in the presence of a man who was full of God's Spirit and had lived a life of service and obedience to Jesus Christ his Savior and Master. I felt I was sitting at the feet of a man who knew Christ intimately and loved Him dearly. I experienced the joy of several visits with this Christian brother and his family.



At my last visit, I realized those moments were a gift from our Lord, as are many moments of joy we have in life. The thought occurred to me that the Lord Himself graces us with His presence, causing our fellowship to be more, far more, than simply a pleasant human experience. We have moments of Christ, much like the disciples Cleopas and Simon experienced on the Emmaus Road. "And their eyes were opened, and they knew Him; and He vanished out of their sight. And they said one to another, Did not our heart burn within us, while He talked with us by the way, and while He opened to us the Scriptures?" (Luke 24:32).

God provides many such moments to His trusting children along the pathways of our lives. As did our brothers of old, we often fail to recognize the presence of the Lord Jesus, focusing on the human elements of our encounters. "*We see through a glass darkly*" declared the Apostle Paul, who included himself among those whose spiritual vision remained hindered and far less than it would one day be (I Corinthians 13:12). So, we must often remind ourselves and each other that the God who numbers the hairs of our head intimately involves Himself as the true Blessing of our blessings.

Do you remember Christ moments in your life where you experienced his beauty in a way that was encouraging and strengthening to you and others? That moment may have come as a result of your devotional life. Your experience of Christ may have become evident in a conversation, a musical, a sunrise, a meal with a friend, a gift, a seemingly random conversation in an elevator or plane. Perhaps you had an act of service you were blessed to perform in Jesus' name. You may have come away from that experience saying, "Lord, you are so good." But there may have been other moments in your life you failed to so clearly recognize.

I have learned to expect such moments, while resisting the temptation to create or rely upon them. Our Light of the World graces us with Himself all along the way of life. We

don't always recognize Him, but can always look for Him. We trust Him to open our eyes when and as His purposes allow. Such expectation helps us to be ready so that we will not miss the Blessing that resides in the blessing. Perhaps today the Light of heaven will pierce through earthly skies to grace us with a time wherein our Savior becomes so obvious that we clearly recognize how near to us He has drawn, and how "*in Him we live and move and have our being*" (Acts 17:28).

May you each day arise, eager to experience Christ in your day. In the words of Mary Ann Barrett, a leader of the Dominican Sisters in Grand Rapids, "May your outreach and service stretch you to embrace all that comes your way with trust, without judgment. May your eyes be opened to see below the surface of things; may your ears be opened to hear God's voice in the pleas for your attention; may your heart be opened to love like God, so that your 'being and acting' bring a little more hope into our world."

I would add a simple thought. Take joyous note of the moments in your life, as from the hand of your Savior. "In Your presence is fullness of joy; at Your right hand are pleasures forevermore" (Psalm 16:11).

From Death to Life—Our Reason for Hope

Spring has arrived, or so it seems. The bitter and unforgiving cold has reluctantly begun to give way to warmer breezes as the sky slowly transitions from the dreary, dull grey to a bright blue, bringing the warmth of the sun to creation. The buds on the trees have broken open bringing forth new leaves and the grasses have greened up coloring our land-scape. While the snow desperately tries to hang on, those April showers have taken over to bring us many spring May flowers. The dismal death of winter has yielded to the new life that comes with spring.


Every year as the seasons change and spring rolls around, I can't help but to reflect on the death and resurrection of our Lord, Christ Jesus. Maybe it's because Easter and Resurrection Sunday were just barely three weeks ago. But I think it's more than that. The visual revelation God provides seems to spur this reflection in my heart. As Christ endured the intolerable scourging and was nailed to the cross, He willingly gave up His life saying, *"It is finished."* John 10:11 reminds us, *"The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."* And from there He was laid in a tomb and the earth was darkened, both physically and spiritually.

But during His time in the grave (metaphorically speaking – winter time), a divine miraculous thing happened. Jesus, who laid down His life, took it up again! The light is shown through the darkness, just as the spring sun drives out the dull, grey skies of winter. This a reminder of what Jesus said, "*I am the light of the world*." (John 7:12a) The tomb was opened just like the buds on the trees, allowing the new leaves to escape their temporary prison. "*Death no longer has mastery over Him*." (Romans 6:9b) The grasses green up, the flowers shoot up and the song of birds returns to testify that new life is here. "*Jesus said to her, I am the resurrection and the life*." (John 11:25a) And those rainy days in April which get us all down nourish the earth bringing in the new life, our spring-May flowers, which bring us much joy. The season has transformed from death to life. Yes, springtime for me is that visual reflection of the hope we have in the risen Messiah.

The apostle Peter reminds us as believers, "*Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have.*" (1 Peter 3:15) Just as the transformation from winter to spring gives us hope for better weather and more comfortable temperatures, the resurrection of Jesus gives us hope for our escape from sin and death to eternal life. But is this the hope we're to provide to those who ask? No, it's only part of it. The real hope is the message of the gospel, and we need not only to provide it to those who ask but also proclaim it to all of creation!

Now before you even think that you're no evangelist, I must tell you that you don't have to be. Our culture and the wicked ones do all they can to discourage people from thinking they cannot properly or accurately spread the good news. But that is a lie and do not believe it! After His resurrection, Jesus, to whom all authority has been given, instructed His disciples to go and make disciples of all nations (Matthew 28:19). The application for us today is exactly the same as it was in the first century, the command from our Lord hasn't changed.

To be obedient to the command of our Lord, all one must do is share the good news of the gospel. And this message is so very simple. As we read in Romans, the Apostle Paul plainly tells us, "*But what does it say? The Word is*

near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart, that is, the message concerning faith that we proclaim: "And here it is folks, the plain and simple message of hope requiring absolutely no exuberant effort or specialized training. "If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord", and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved." (Romans 10:8-9) That's it. The message of the gospel was plainly spoken and simply put by the Apostle Paul whom Jesus Himself had chosen to spread the good news to the Gentile nations. Believe and have faith – and <u>YOU WILL BE SAVED!</u>

Are you an obedient believer? Have you shared the good news with others you know, or even those you don't? If you haven't, is it because you've been fearful to do it incorrectly or that you are not trained enough in God's Word? Faith in Christ Jesus is what justifies us before God, and faith is a gift from God. Why keep this gift to yourselves? If you're a believer, then you must feel the love for others in your heart to share the good news. Don't listen to the whispers of the adversary who tries to discourage you. Don't listen to the whispers of the adversary who says, "You can do it tomorrow," because tomorrow may be too late. The Holy Spirit will guide you and lead you in sharing the good news, just trust Him. Each of us will give an account before God. Make sure your account reflects the sharing of God's gift in Christ Jesus.

Spread the word, our world needs it!
