Another year is coming to a close. For the Congregational Kitchen it was a year filled with abundant food, hard work, truck challenges, sadness, mortgage challenges, faithful volunteers, fundraising, and untold blessings. Throughout it all, we are thankful to God for bringing us thru. He has provided us with the food, hard working faithful workers, and funds needed to keep the lights on. For those of you reading this article you know that 16 years ago the CK was started by Don Lucas. It was Don's vision, coupled with a small group of like-minded people, that first opened the doors of the kitchen and provided a warm meal to anyone who came. No questions asked. This was not a one-time offering of a dinner, but a commitment to the community to be offered every Thursday night. God blessed Don's vision, and with the faithfulness of workers, God grew it into what it is today.

In the past sixteen years, the CK has experienced many changes. Growth is frequently discussed. What strikes me most is the faithfulness of the workers who come on a weekly basis and offer their talents. Over time, the small group has grown bigger and, yes, some of the faces of the original

group have been replaced with new faces. This growth has allowed the vision of feeding those in need to continue.

Sadly, early this year Don Lucas was called home by his Heavenly Father. I am confident that Don was welcomed with words we all long to hear, "Well done thou good and faithful servant." We miss Don's welcoming smile and quick wit. As Don would have wanted, the Congregational Kitchen continued on without skipping a beat. Every Thursday, the kitchen serves a delicious warm takeout meal to anyone who comes. No questions asked. When people ask me about how the CK was started, I not only tell them about Don, but I often ask them if they know the story in the Bible about David and Goliath. You see, in the beginning when we first talked about feeding those in need, we had no idea the growth God had intended for the CK. If we had known then what we do now, we would have been like David's brothers who saw a giant and said that's too big for us. God, in His understanding of who we are, grew us into who we are today. All He asked of us was for us to be faithful in what He has given us to do. Did you know that while we are busy cooking at the



kitchen, the warehouse, located in the industrial park, receives 2 to 3 truck loads of food every Thursday? That food is not only for our kitchen to use, it is sorted, cleaned, divided and readied for distribution every Friday to 16 pantries and 3 homeless kitchens. Those who pick up the food on Friday come from 5 different counties: Allegan, Kalamazoo, Kent, Ottawa, and Van Buren. They are then able to distribute the food and make a difference within their own communities. Simultaneously while we are distributing the food to the pantries, there is a group of volunteers who come to the warehouse to pick up "Backpack" bags. These bags are to be delivered to Allegan public schools. The bags are filled with 2 days worth of non -perishable food items to help the children who qualify with sustainable food for the weekend. Currently there are just under 400 children who qualify for help. We are blessed to have the food to give them, as well as the volunteers who deliver them and

the volunteers who pack them every other Tuesday morning. Monday morning the warehouse clean room is buzzing with a group of faithful workers who take the commercially packed items that were received on

Thursday's trucks and repackage them into smaller units for Friday's distribution to pantries. It is estimated that the Kitchen along with the pantries are feeding over 7000 people on a weekly basis. One man's vision grown by God. The Congregational Kitchen is run totally by volunteers. You are welcome to come and partner with us. Do you want to be a difference maker within your community? We covet your prayers, monetary gifts and willing hands.

The Glory of God

We have made it to the halfway marker of the first semester. I was supposed to have my fall break the first part of November, but the government canceled it. Instead, we will have an extra week off after Christmas. In this way, the government hopes to save some money in the face of rising energy costs. The thought is that it won't have to heat the schools for a week during the colder time of the year. Since Julia and I had already made arrangements to spend the Fall Break in the town of Nyíregyháza, I took the week off from school. Nyíregyháza is in the northeastern corner of the country.

We are still recovering from recent surgical procedures. While my recovery has been much slower than I was hoping and expecting, I have not had any major setbacks. Julia, too, is healing nicely, albeit slowly. We are still awaiting the results of the histology report and pray the results are good.

Recently, I have been reading through the Gospel of John. In John 11, we find the well-known account of Lazarus. We learn Lazarus was sick (as it turned out, his disease was fatal), and he and his sisters were well-known to Jesus. In versus 5-6, John tells us,

"Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister, and Lazarus. So when He heard that he was sick, He then stayed two days longer in the place where He was." I had to read this several times to make sure I got it right. John tells us that because Jesus loved Martha and Mary, He delayed coming to see them for two extra days! At first, I thought to myself, if this is the way You treat the people You love, no wonder you have so few followers. But this is not the end of the story...

Why did He delay? After all, John tells us that He loved this family. Martha and Mary wanted a miracle. And this is not a bad thing. Jesus performed many miracles. But in this case, Jesus wanted to give them something greater than a miracle. He wanted them to see the glory of God!

When Jesus finally did show up, Martha went out to meet Him at the edge of town. Mary, too, got to the place where Jesus was waiting, crying, "Lord, if You had been here, my brother would not have died." Mary fell at Jesus' feet weeping, Jesus wept, as well. It turns out our God is not some immoveable concept. Our God is a person. As John tells us in his first epistle, God is also love.

Moreover, He created us out of that love so that we might be in a relationship with Him.

Jesus told those present to remove the stone in front of Lazarus' tomb. "'Did I not say to you, if you believe, you will see the glory of God?' Then, after giving thanks to God the Father, Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come forth.'" (v. 40)

Then, those who previously had simply been hoping for a miracle witnessed the glory of God! I used to imagine that the "glory of God" was something like a blinding light with beams radiating outward from some sight too beautiful to describe. It turns out, the "glory of God" looks more like an extra from the set of Zombie Apocalypse—a former corpse wrapped in bandages walking out of a tomb. It is Death overcome! As Jesus said to Martha (v. 25-26), "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believe in Me shall live even if he dies, and everyone who lives and believes in Me shall never die. Do you believe this?"

I hope that in my desire to see a miracle (especially in our own case), I don't miss the glory of God. You can pray that somehow we would help others see the glory of God.
