As we enter October, we notice the inevitable changes that begin to take place as we leave one season and enter another. The days begin to shorten, the air becomes cooler, and the mornings are now crisp with a light hint of frost on the grass. We see the leaves begin to change color and our flowers, which were once in full bloom displaying all their majesty are now fading and turning that wonderful shade of brown. The farmers are out working the fields, harvesting their crops, and preparing for next spring's planting. All these are visible signs of a changing season. A transition from one place to another. But there's another change that's been taking place, ever so slowly. Have you noticed it? Have you felt it in your spirit? This change is that of our

This change is that of our current culture. A move away from what is right to what is wrong. At least, from our perspective as believers

in Christ. Recently, Ligonier Ministries and Lifeway Research released their 2022 report called "The State of Theology." The results were quite interesting, to say the least, and seem to correlate with our current postmodern culture. For example, people who were surveyed were asked, "Does God change?" A shocking 51% of U.S. adults agreed that God does change and that He learns and adapts to different circumstances. In another question, 23% of U.S. adults increasingly reject the divine authorship of the Bible, "relegating it to the same category as other religious writings and purportedly sacred texts." Comparing that to a 2014 survey, one sees a 12% increase. While that may not seem like a lot, there is a definite change taking place. Additionally, more and more Americans take the view that the "Bible's commands against homosexuality are no

longer applicable in society today." While there has been some variability, 2022 reveals an overall increasing secular trend over the years.

As believers, we know that the key to Christianity is Jesus' assertion that He alone is "the way, and the truth, and the life," and that "no one comes to the Father except through Me [Him]" (John 14:6). "Trends over time and the 2022 survey results reveal an increasingly unbiblical belief among evangelicals that God is pleased by worship that comes from those outside the Christian faith." As a believer in Christ, you know the truth and you should have a firm relationship with Him.

So, what does this all mean? Just like we can visibly see changes in the seasons, we need to keep watch for the changes that occur in humanity and mankind. While these seasons have come and gone before, each day we grow closer to a time when the

seasons will end, and the Day of the Lord will be upon us. Though these things that are occurring in our culture may be disturbing and the cards may appear to be stacked against us, I urge you all to stand firm in your faith! Boldly profess the Gospel to others every opportunity you have. In 2 Peter 1:1-2 the apostle Peter tells us, "But there were also false prophets among the people, just as there will be false teachers among you. They will secretly introduce destructive heresies, even denying

the Sovereign Lord who bought them — bringing swift destruction on themselves. Many will follow their shameful ways and will bring the way of truth into disrepute." Our adversary is hard at work. Be mindful of what you see and hear and seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit every day.

While these seasons and trends have come and gone before, it is clear that with each season of sinful deceit there is an increase of those who look to other "supposed truths" falling susceptible to the false teachings and lies of our time, while those who once professed God's truth decrease. But if we hold firm in our faith, on which we have taken our stand, we maintain hope in the One who will one day make all things new. As Peter reminds us, "His divine power has given us everything we need for life and godliness through our knowledge of him who called us by His own glory and goodness."

# An Update from Will Dickerson



Julia and I are now back in
Budapest after spending the month
of August in Nashville with my
daughter, Abby, and her family.
Abby and Peter are in the process
of adopting a 22-month-old boy
by the name of Reese. Reese has a
plethora of medical issues and
special needs — not the least of
which is the need for a kidney
transplant. Your prayers for all
involved would be greatly
appreciated

When we returned to Budapest, we had to hit the ground running. The new school year began on September 1. This year, I have been slated to teach 16 lessons/week. This is down a wee bit from last year, but this reduction in classes comes at my request. Last year was quite a challenge, so I thought I should take it a little easier this year.

Julia volunteers with the MOPS ministry by keeping an eye on the children so that the moms can meet, talk, and do their studies together. You can pray that this ministry will bear much fruit this year. Julia will also resume teaching Sunday School.

Another prayer request is for Julia's vision. Some years ago, she was diagnosed with Retinitis pigmentosa, a degenerative eye disease. Her condition had been relatively stable for the last few years, but recently it has taken a new turn for the worse. Her vision has degenerated to the point where it is becoming increasingly difficult for her to read, even with enlarged print. You can pray that God would strengthen her vision.

Following my quarterly PSA test, which monitors the cancer marker doctors use to follow patients with prostate cancer, I got really good news! I very much appreciate your prayers. Thank you!

Now I have another prayer request. Unfortunately, it seems that something has come unraveled in my abdomen. I am experiencing quite a bit of pain and discomfort. Dr. Mavrogenis determined that I have a hernia of great magnitude, and he told me I have to go find a surgeon. I guess since this is no longer a matter of urological or oncological concern, it doesn't fall within his purview. I am assuming this is going to lead to another up-closeand-personal encounter with the Hungarian medical system. I am also assuming this will knock me out of commission for a few weeks. I wish I could tell you that I was thrilled about this development and that I was full of thanksgiving and praise . . . but

I would be lying. I think the technical word I would use for this is "bummer." At the moment, I am struggling in the attitude department.

During the month of August, I was able to finish The Weight of *Glory*, the collection of C.S. Lewis' essays that draws its title from the lead essay. This is a wonderful and very insightful essay. If you have not yet read it, I urge you to add it to your own "to read" list. I would also add two of his other essays to the reading list: "On Forgiveness," and "A Slip of the Tongue." These are well worth your time! I also finished reading You Are Not Your Own by Alan Noble. This is also a very good book that is worthy of your attention. It offers a good analysis of our contemporary culture and its mindset, but also lays out for us a healthy Christian response.

Once again, we would like to express our deep thanks and appreciation to you for all your prayers and support. We are most grateful for the kindness and generosity shown to us by so many of you as we try to let our light shine. We could not do what we are doing here if it were not for you standing behind us. Thank you!

# An Update from the Frasers: Twenty Years in Hungary



It feels like a lifetime ago! When we first packed up everything and moved to Budapest in 2002, Hannah wasn't quite two, and Tricia was three months pregnant with Matthew. When we look back over the years, we see so many ups and downs, trials and difficulties, and yet we also see God's wonderful faithfulness! He has provided for us, guided us, and encouraged us - many times through you, our faithful supporters. Some of you have been with us since the very beginning, and some just got to know us recently. We are so thankful for all of you! We couldn't still be here without you!

We're also thankful for a lot of things about this past summer. Tricia was able to work in the library, keeping it open for those families in the community who were here. And as we shared last spring, we've had a number of ministry families from Kiev and Moscow move to Budapest and enroll their children at ICSB. As they arrived, many of those families were SO excited to use the library. Our summer library mornings were busier than ever, and our summer circulation numbers DOUBLED from previous years. It was a joy to be able to bless our new families this way,



and we trust that providing their kids with great reading material made their move to Hungary just a bit brighter. Classes have resumed, many of which are at capacity with the recent influx of people displaced by the war.

Last week, we had our Teach
Beyond school year kick-off. John
encouraged us all to keep growing
and being transformed by Christ,
which is the only thing that will
enable us to be agents of transformation in the lives of our
students. We're thankful that
we're not called to work in our
own strength. We're praying that
the Lord will work in us and
through us.

As we head into the new year, please pray for us:

Lift up the new staff at ICSB as they adjust to life in Hungary, and teaching in our community. We have three new staff who moved here because of the war, and three new staff with TeachBeyond. Our new



TeachBeyond staff are: Luiza - teaching 2nd grade. Haley - teaching 8th grade Bible and middle grades ELL. Kyle - teaching art and graphic design to middle and upper grades.

Pray for an end to the war in Ukraine, and for peace to prevail. And please lift all those who are displaced. We're thankful that our community can provide a safe landing place for some, but there is still sorrow and loss for everything they've left behind.

Tricia is one of the team leaders in the re-accreditation process for the school this fall. This is a brand new role for her and she'd appreciate prayers as they prepare for the accreditation team that will examine the school in January.

Continue to pray for John as he serves the TeachBeyond team here as team leader. Pray for wisdom for him and for open doors to teach about apologetics and discipleship.

Flowers sweet the West Wind offers, Peeping forth from vines and trees, Brings the butterflies so brilliant, And the busy, humming bees.


Each wind brings its own best treasure To our land from year to year, Blessings many without measure. E'er attend the winds' career.
